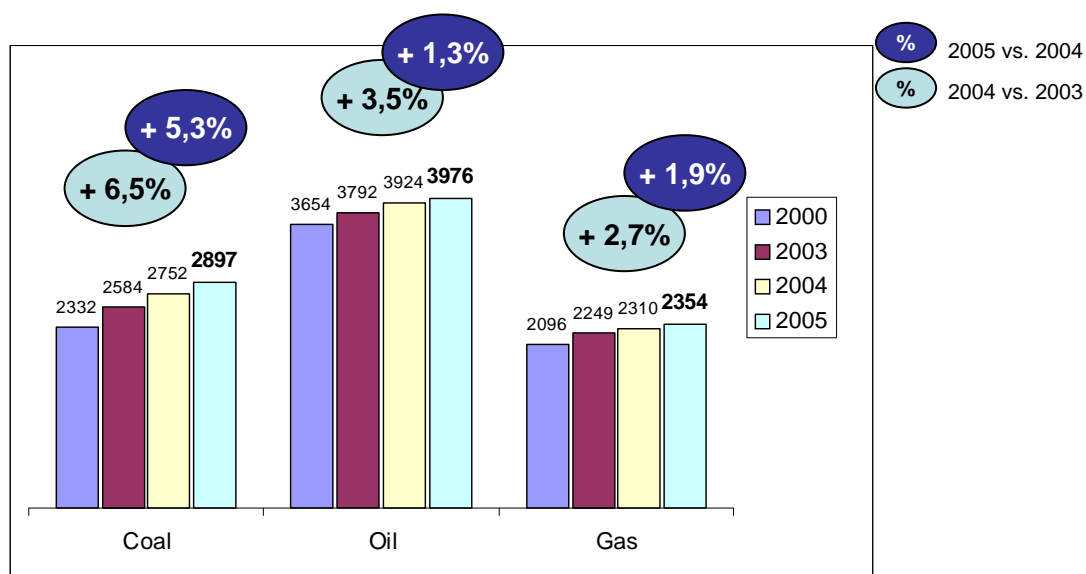


Object : Exclusive Release of 2005 World Energy Data

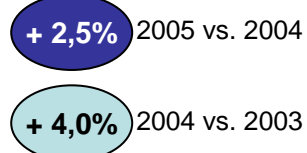
According to the latest estimates of **Enerdata**, a leading energy data provider, the world energy consumption growth in 2005 was two times slower than the world economic growth: 2.5% vs 4.8%. This contrasts with the situation in 2004, when the pace of the energy consumption growth was similar to the world economic growth (4% vs. 5.3%). These estimates are based on data compilation from more than 70 countries worldwide, accounting for 95% of the world total energy consumption.

As expected with the soaring crude oil prices, the demand for refined oil products has sharply reduced, from 3.5% in 2004 to 1.3% in 2005. In China, this slowdown has been very significant (increase by 2,1% in 2005 vs. 16% in 2004), as well as in OECD countries (decrease of demand by -0.2% in North America and by -0.5% in Europe). The growth of coal demand has remained high, and has benefited from substitutions due to high oil prices, particularly in China and in India. The gas demand has slightly decreased (+1.9% vs. 2.7% in 2004).

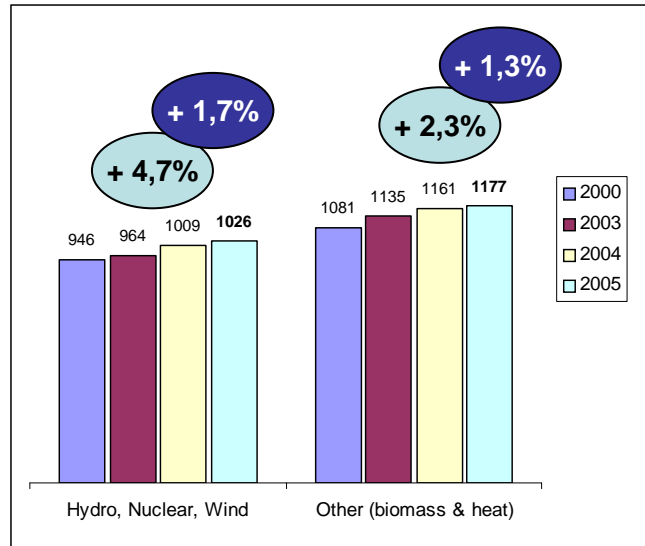

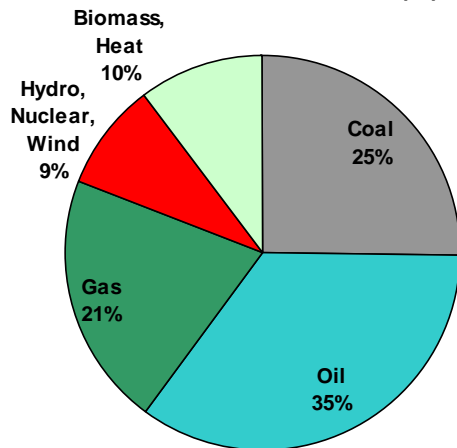
World Supply of Nuclear & Renewable (Mtoe)



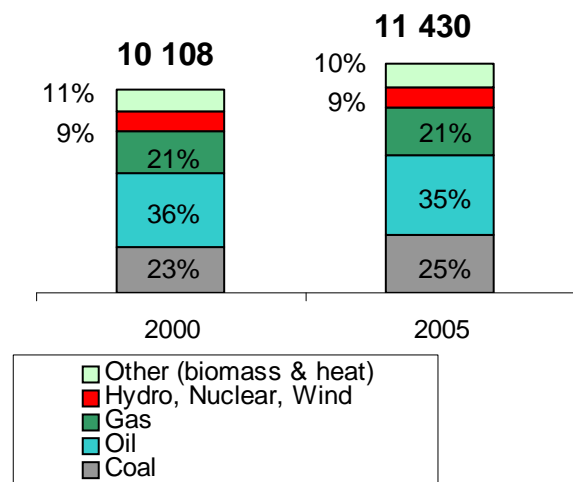
% 2005 vs. 2004

The supply of electricity from nuclear and renewable energies increased by 1.7% in 2005 vs. 2004. In 2004, the 4.7% growth was exceptionally high due to the restart of Japanese nuclear power plants. The total electricity consumption remains fast growing with +4% in 2005, similar to 2004.
